- Founder's Day Barbecue a Success

The Beta Mu Chapter of Pi Kappa Alpha is celebrating its 91st year on UT's campus. It is a pleasure to report a highly successful spring recruitment with eight new members and exceptional academic standing. Pike brothers are also enjoying leadership positions in campus organizations like the Texas Cowboys and Silver Spurs. Two new spring Rowels are **Brady Maus '09** and **Campbell Anderson '09** and Texas Cowboy Newman **Matt Dunn '09**.

The spring 2011 pledge class consisted of eight young men from throughout Texas, as well as California and Maryland. These members were initiated in May and follow a terrific fall 2010 pledge class of 35 brothers who were initiated in December. We now have an overall active chapter membership of 125 Pikes.

Our brothers' G.P.A.s placed high among IFC standings last year with an overall chapter G.P.A. of 3.2. This solid academic performance earned Beta Mu the Scholarship Award at the International Pike Fraternity's annual convention last summer, where we also earned the One Hundred Man Chapter Award. We appreciate the efforts of the new Alumni Advisory Board which arranged a meeting with the Dallas Federal Reserve Bank president as part of the new Career Development Series. There, brothers learned about the Federal Reserve System and discussed the regional and national economy. Several of our undergraduates were also invited to a Dallas area alumni gathering and were able to meet several of the local alumni.

We are grateful to Beta Mu alumni for ongoing support. Beta Mu is boldly entering its 10th decade at the University of Texas. There has never been a time to have more pride in your membership as a Beta Mu alumnus or undergraduate. We encourage all alumni to visit the chapter house when in Austin.



Beta Mu Chapter Provides Lifelong Memories

Why did you decide to attend the University of Texas?

I had friends from high school that were going to attend UT at the same time and I knew it had an outstanding business school.

Why did you decide to join a fraternity and why did you choose ΠΚΑ?

My longtime Pike friend, Ken Burch '59, persuaded the Pikes to invite me to a recruitment event which he was attending. We both liked the members and the group that was to be our pledge class. Also the fraternity had an excellent reputation.

What are some of your favorite memories as an undergraduate?

The Pike Swamp Party, Dream Girl Party and the good times at the weekly TGIF music parties and other events that the Pikes had throughout the year. The Longhorn football games were very exciting as we were among the top 10 teams most of the years that I was there and, of course, the Pike festivities that were held after the games. One very special memory is the Dream Girl ceremony that was held for my wife, Judy.

What did your undergraduate experience mean to you?

As a Pike, it made me feel as though I was part of a family of friends from many different parts of the country that I identified with. It gave me a sense of belonging and made me a better person.

Was there anyone specific that you looked up to in the chapter? If so, why?

It is difficult for me to say as there were many Pikes that I looked up to. However, my big brother, **Buddy**Nelson '59 and my pledge brothers, **Ken Burch** '59 and **Richard Morrison** '59 were very influential. Buddy was of great help in guiding me and giving me advice during my college career. Both Ken and Dick became close friends of ours and we have enjoyed many memorable events during our lifetimes.

What degree did you earn?

Bachelor's degree in business administration.

Did you hold any offices while in the house?

Yes, I was social chairman.

There are some wonderful pictures of you and Judy from your undergraduate days; how did you two meet?

We first met at an accounting class in Waggener Hall. She was a knockout and caught the attention of most of the students that were in the class. What advice would you give to younger alumni who are early in their careers?

Study hard, get "street smart" and be ready to take chances when the right time and place comes along. Don't be afraid even if you fail. You won't know how hard it is to fall until you've climbed to the top. Don't ever give up and keep climbing no matter what.

What advice would you give to undergraduate members?

What are some life lessons you learned from your time at IIKA?

I grew up in Mexico and in Texas. Judy and I now live in San Antonio and spend a lot of time at our ranch near Nixon, Texas. We lived in Mexico City for 47 years....many wonderful years....enjoying the music, the culture, the food and friendships of Mexico.

What are some of your hobbies, and what do you do like to do in your free time?

Collecting art and pre-Columbian artifacts. I spend a lot of my time fishing and hunting.

ALUMNUS REFLECTIONS: BILL BOLDT '80

n the fall of 1979 I pledged Pi Kappa Alpha in what would be the most defining year of my life. As I entered pledgeship, I only had two things on my mind: having fun and my G.P.A. I wanted to find the perfect intersection between having the most fun I could have, and maintaining a high enough G.P.A that would allow me to pursue law school. As I evaluated my life up to that point, what better place for that to happen than 2400 Leon St. and the Forty Acres?

It was safe to say, the last thing on my mind was my spiritual life. In fact, most of my life I had very little interest in that kind of thing. My family, for the most part, did not bring religion into the forefront of our

lives growing up. Why would I be interested now? To my surprise, however, that all began to change after pledging. Shortly after pledgeship started, my then big brother, Randy Schroeder '78, asked me to be in a Bible study with four other pledges. To this day it still amazes me that the first Bible study I ever attended was in the Pike chapter house.

This was the first time in my life that the Bible, having a relationship with God through Christ, and my life connected. In fact, as the semester passed and after our initiation in February, my interest continued to grow. That spring Randy graduated and asked me to consider leading the house Bible study in the fall. Reluctantly, I led my first Bible study after dinner on Wednesday night in the fall of 1980 and continued doing so



until graduating in 1982. It's hard to believe that thirty-one years later I am still leading Bible studies in fraternity houses. I got involved with the same student organization Randy was involved with, Campus Crusade for Christ, and have been on staff with the organization ever since graduating.

Sam Dawson '80 was acquainted with Bill growing up in San Antonio and they became close friends during pledgeship. Dawson notes, "Bill has made many financial and personal sacrifices to pursue and fulfill his calling. He lives each day for Christ and many of us have been blessed by his ministry."

My wife, Julie, had a similar experience in the Chi Omega sorority at Auburn University. We married in 1987 and live in Auburn with our six children where we lead the Campus Crusade for Christ ministry. We have worked at four different universities, most recently at Auburn, since 1996. Our life's work has been to bring the gospel message to the Greek community. Since working on Auburn's campus I have also become the chapter advisor for the Upsilon Chapter of Pi Kappa Alpha. My life was shaped and profoundly changed during my time at 2400 Leon St. and I am grateful for both the experience and brotherhood of Pi Kappa Alpha. Interestingly enough, it all started in an inconspicuous Bible study that, to my knowledge, had a legacy for the next 15-20 years after Randy started it.

ALUMNUS UPDATE: TOM SCOTT '67



Scott '67 retired in 2003 from a career as an executive officer with The University of Texas System administration. From 2004 to 2007 he was affiliated with the University of Texas at San Antonio, serving as director of research of a major study that examined programs in Texas designed to enable more young Texans to successfully participate in college. Tom is active in the Bastrop community, having served as the Mayor of Bastrop for ten years and as chairman of the Bastrop Economic Development Corporation. He is a past president of the Bastrop Education Foundation, a board member of the Dr. Martin Luther King Jr. Scholarship Committee, and a member of the Bastrop County Texas Exes scholarship committee. He earned a bachelor's degree in economics and a master's degree in urban affairs from the University of Texas at Arlington. Tom and his wife, Nancy, live in a 160-plus-year old home in Bastrop that they have carefully restored; their home is listed as a Texas historic landmark.
